## **10 Common Mistakes in Writing Ministry Plans**

- 1. Only putting *new* programs, activities, and initiatives in your ministry plan and not including or building on *existing* ones.
- 2. Placing goals and initiatives in only **one value** that definitely has overlap in **one or more values**. If it is written in one value and applies to another, make a note of it.
- 3. Programs, goals, and initiatives that are *not measurable or quantifiable*.
- 4. Programs, goals, and initiatives that are *not obtainable*. Be realistic and honest. Use what you accomplished last year as a baseline and build from that.
- 5. The *leadership team* of a particular ministry is *not involved in the planning process* and *implementation* of the ministry plan. Share your plan with your leaders.
- 6. Seeing the ministry planning process as an *administrative task* rather than a *spiritual process*. Pray and listen for God to speak to you and the leaders involved with you.
- 7. Thinking that once the ministry plan is *finished* it can be set aside *rather than* being used *as a fluid document*. It should be used with your leaders and adjusted and "tuned" as you minister through the year.
- 8. Looking for ways to "cheat" the process instead of allowing the process to help your ministry change and get better each year.
- 9. Not interacting with the *Value Champions*...They are a *resource* for you when you have problems or questions in the ministry planning process.
- 10. Viewing this opportunity as misuse of time and not *valuing* the process and tools created give you *success* in your ministry planning.
