

Curfew for 60 Million

In other cities, officials Tuesday dealt with blowback from previous violent incidents. Prosecutors in Atlanta charged six officers after they used stun guns on two unarmed black college students driving downtown. In Richmond, the mayor apologized after police tear-gassed peaceful protesters. And in Philadelphia, the mayor criticized police officers who posed for photos with a group of white vigilantes wielding baseball bats and shovels.

More than 60 million people were under curfews in 200 cities and 27 states because of the protests. The measures were intended to separate peaceful demonstrators from looters and vandals. At least 17,000 National Guard troops had been activated.

On the Death of George Floyd

- Byron Spencer, handing out water and burgers to protesters outside Los Angeles City Hall, said he was both "elated and defeated" by word of the new charges. He said he had seen countless surges of outrage over police brutality against black men, only to have it happen again.

Other Causal Elements

Floyd's death could hardly have come at a more explosive time. And the violence and rage reflects that, observers say.

"This outbreak of demonstrations is not just about George Floyd," said Cat Brooks, who co-founded the Anti Police-Terror Project after Grant was shot to death in Oakland by a BART Police officer. "It's about Philando Castile, Breonna Taylor and all the other victims, and about rage by black and brown people that has been going on for many years.

"But one thing that's different is that right now, a lot of people doing these protests are stuck in their houses, lost their jobs, don't know if they will be able to make a living," Brooks said. "They're stressed, they got the bulls-\$1,200 stimulus check, and they're angry.






There Are Complexities

Lawrence Kobilinsky, a forensics expert at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, said he was struck by the difference between the county's official autopsy and Dr. Baden's private autopsy.

Mr. Kobilinsky said lawyers could make a point of the presence of fentanyl in Mr. Floyd's body. Although the amount required to be lethal varies, fentanyl can stop a person's heart and breathing.



There was nothing in the full autopsy that made him change his medical opinion. "Restraint is what caused the death."





"I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion," King wrote, while sitting in an Alabama jail, "that the Negro's great stumbling block in his stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen's Counciler or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate, who is more devoted to 'order' than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice."

I made a commitment years ago to fight my natural preference for order and seek justice instead, so that those words would never be true of me




